We have made it to the end of the first half term! The Reception children are well and truly settled into school life and are very much part of Kildwick CE School. They love spending time with their buddies and have developed some lovely new friendships. The year one children have really impressed me, they have been great role models and showed real kindness to their new friends. Thank you for all your support in settling the children into / back into school.

We have enjoyed our writing this half term with our focus being on a favourite book of mine, 'We are going on a bear hunt'. The children have enjoyed a bear hunt on the rec and Grandma Fantastic has helped us learn new vocabulary to be able to retell the story. We have been composing our own sentences and year ones have used their phonic knowledge to sentence stack and retell the whole story. Reception children have been learning to use their segmenting fingers to write CVC words and worked extremely hard on their phonics, they particularly liked learning their first digraph; 'two letters, one sound'.

Year one children have worked hard with their friends from Swallows class in their Maths lessons and have made some great progress with place value work. They are working hard on their fluency in Maths everyday alongside their new learning. Don't forget to spend time on Numbots, this will really help them in school.

Year one children finished our local history work with a visit to Skipton Castle. I am really impressed with the knowledge they have retained and they seem to have loved this topic. All of the children loved making a castle in the outdoor area using pallets and crates. We even had our very own moat - which resulted in some soggy children!

In Science we have been learning all about animals, there was some tricky vocabulary to remember but with lots of repetition we have remembered our new scientific vocabulary. We thought about what animals need for survival and realised that the birds may become short of food over the winter so we decided to make some bird feeders. The most exciting part was getting really messy!

We had a great time at the Skipton Movement Skills festival. The children loved all nine activities and had chance to practise the things they have been learning in PE on a Friday with Mrs Wilkinson. Coach Jonny Moore commented that, 'they all showed great enthusiasm and skill and practised all our partnership values. The comments all suggested what a strong PE bunch they are - a testament to PE in your school and they did you proud'.

## Loving to Learn





This half term has certainly flown by and it is fantastic to see all the children settled and happy in Swallows class. The children have all worked incredibly hard and should be very proud of how much we have managed to fit in to a half term.

In Science this half term we have learnt about the features of each type of animal and their needs to survive. We enjoyed lots of practical lessons such as making our own bird feeders and handling a real fish. Not many children wanted to touch the ingredients for our feeders but almost everyone wanted to touch and inspect the fish!

Our local history topic this half term was all about Skipton Castle. This culminated in an enjoyable trip there last week. The children had remembered so much information they impressed our guides with their knowledge. As always, the 'long drop' and dungeon were firm favourites.

In writing, we have created fiction writing using the book 'We are going on a bear hunt'. We then moved onto non fiction writing about sharks. I have been really proud of how the children have been brave writers willing to have a go and not be worried about making mistakes. They are applying phonics into their spelling with more confidence and remembering to read their work back to ensure it makes sense.

In PE we have been working on our fundamental skills, we have learnt to travel in a wide variety of ways and dodge obstacles by changing direction. We also had a fantastic morning at Sandylands in Skipton, taking part in the movement festival. The children took part in nine different activities demonstrating resilience and teamwork.

Both year one and year two have been working on place value, addition and subtraction in maths. Mrs Kingham has been impressed with year one and their understanding of numbers. They have really risen to the challenge of recording more in their maths lessons. Year two love the challenge of our daily ten questions and it's great to see them answer with enthusiasm and increased fluency.

Hopefully, you were impressed with our windmills. The children worked so hard to design, make and evaluate them. We had great fun testing if they worked by using a giant fan. Thankfully, they did! The children were very proud and rightly so.

# **Kingfishers**

Well done Kingfishers! The year three children have all taken the step up to key stage two in their stride and amazed me with their perseverance. The year fours have stepped up to being the oldest in the class and helped the year three children settle into key stage two. It's been great to see, especially in this super long half term.

Going over to the rec for forest school has seen us get very creative. From mud painting to boat building we have enjoyed ourselves whatever the weather. We have even been able to bring some of the autumn wilderness inside, with our beautiful fallen leaf wreath.







In History, we have explored the Anglo-Saxons. The children especially loved creating their Anglo-Saxon villages and warrior fact files, particularly choosing their own Anglo-Saxon's name. It is great to see the children use their connected knowledge as well as building new knowledge.

In Science, we have had the opportunity to carry out lots of experiments. First learning all about air resistance before moving onto water resistance and gravity. We explored using apparatuses such as weighing scales and stop watches. Recording our results was also an important part of each experiment. We talked about the reliability of our results and what we could do differently to make them more reliable.









In PSHE, our topic has been 'Me and My Relationships'. This has led us to explore many different friendship scenarios. We have focused mainly on resolving conflict. The children's favourite method seeming to be 'compromise'.

Our incredible rugby playing can not be forgotten. Whilst at the start of the game, we had some confusion over which end we were at but we rallied together and brought the trophy home!

#### <u>Owls</u>

This half term started off with a mission to Mars. During English lessons, we have studied and then written a report from a stranded astronaut accidentally left by their crew following a disaster. We used Matt Damon's character Mark Watney in The Martia as our inspiration for the transmissions back to Earth.

Our Science topic has covered different types of forces. We started with friction and then moved onto investigating air & water resistance. For our enquiries we made different sized parachutes and then streamlined/less streamlined shapes to travel through water. Finally we applied our knowledge of forces to gravity and discovered **all objects free fall at the same rate regardless of their mass.** I know! Hard to comprehend but (without air resistance) a hammer and feather hit the ground at the same time on the moon!

Our Science and English work was given an extra boost by an intergalactic journey in a Planetarium. One visited Sutton and we were lucky enough to visit. Lying on our backs, we were transported back to the birth of our universe. Back in the present day, the movement of the moon around the Earth and the way the sun's light reaches Earth. All very useful because our next science topic is about Earth and space.

This half term we have visited the swimming pool each week and everyone's hard work is paying off. We have lots of confident swimmers already and many more making noticeable improvements each week.

Before the weather went fully autumnal, we also managed to prepare the beds in the community garden. Working together, Owls cleared the old growth and topped the beds up with our very own compost and manure - ready for the next crops.

Finally, this week we engaged in a design and technology bridge building project. Firstly, arch and beams bridges were constructed out of card but using corrugation and lamination to strengthen them. We moved onto truss bridges next, realising that triangles are strong shapes. The children practised the construction using art straws before moving onto cutting, shaping and bonding wooden structures. Again, super teamwork meant some excellent bridges were produced, with the strongest being able to take a load of 6kg!

Year Six have enjoyed learning about the ancient Maya civilisation in our history lessons. We've explored the Maya writing and number systems, food, gods and their calendar system. Our music lessons have also been linked to the Maya through the ancient myth of The Hero Twins. Mr Schofield was really impressed with the soundtracks to scenes from the story that the children performed.

Year Six have put in lots of hard work in maths this half term to get their place value and four operations skills secure. We've had a few tricky new concepts like long division and BODMAS but everyone has risen to the challenge. After half term, we will be working on our fractions skills whilst continuing to embed everything learnt this half term through arithmetic sessions.

It was lovely to be able to invite parents in for our activity morning last week. The children embraced the role of teacher and the adults were good sports in playing the pupil. Although I'm sure many of the grown ups were glad when the long division and grammar activities ended and it was time to get creative by making Maya themed masks that the children had designed. The masks were all brilliant!

We've loved our class book which has been 'Holes' by Louis Sachar. We flew through it and had some amazing discussions. It was also a great end of term treat to watch the film together and discuss the similarities and differences. We started reading 'Oh Maya Gods' by Maz Evans as our next book and look forward to finishing that after half term. I've loved to see how passionate and interested about reading Year Six are. We spent some time at the start of the year restocking our reading area and chose lots of new books to buy using funds raised by last year's Year Six and it's lovely seeing the children work their way through the titles.



### South Craven Cross Country Cluster Event

The weather didn't stop us from taking part in the local cluster cross country event at South Craven. It was fantastic to see so many children competing and having so much fun! Ten pupils came within the top eight and progressed through to the Craven final at Giggleswick.
