Robins

Here we are halfway through the Summer term and Robins have had another busy and exciting half term. I can't believe that I am actually planning learning for the last half term of this year. The children are all getting ready to move into year one and year two and we are already talking about all the exciting things they will do in their new year at school.

The trip to Nell Bank was a big success with all the children being engaged and involved in their outdoor learning. We took part in pond dipping, bug hunting, and spent time in the woods. As always the most popular activity was the water play session, lots of wet and happy children!

In Science we have been germinating and planting and we will continue to observe our sunflowers and broad beans which are in the Peggy Wilson community garden. The children have been learning all about deciduous and evergreen trees and really enjoyed all the new vocabulary including 'deciduous' and 'evergreen'.

The First Aid lesson was very exciting, there's nothing better than getting a plaster when you are young! It did prove rather tricky to work out who needed an accident letter at the end of the day and lots of children role playing having an accident did have staff on edge as we worked out which were the real cries!

In PSHE we have been learning all about having a, 'can do' attitude and working on resilience with the children. The children are also really enjoying using our zones of regulation check in and thinking about how they are feeling. It has really helped some children to describe and understand their feelings.

The children really enjoyed our work on 'The Proudest Blue' and produced some amazing writing. They confidently acted out parts of the story and thought about the feelings of the characters. The new addition of hijabs to our dressing up selection proved to be a great success. The Snail and the Whale is one of my favourite books and we have enjoyed using this story to help us learn how to write a postcard for our Non Fiction writing.

Year one children have continued to enjoy their Maths lessons with Miss Hussain and Mrs Kingham and the other year one children,. They particularly enjoyed their halving lesson which involved chocolate cake! Reception children are really starting to show fluency with their mental maths skills and they enjoyed working on doubling by painting and printing.

In History the children have been learning all about the great fire of London. I was so impressed at their recall of the key knowledge and the interest they had in learning all about the past. They were great at thinking about how things have changed and what it must have been like to live in the past.

I know that we will have just as much fun with our learning next half term as we get ready to move the children on to their next year with either myself or Mrs Carpenter.

Swallows

As we draw to the end of another half term I cannot believe how fast the weeks are flying by. Some of the highlights of this half term include celebrating King Charles III coronation with a picnic, singing and dancing. A fantastic trip to Nell bank where we built giant nests, badger homes, sorted recycling and hunted for mini beasts. The children were polite, well behaved and enthusiastic. They were a real pleasure to take! All the children were given first aid training. They learnt how to care for someone who may be injured, who to call in an emergency and how to give CPR. All amazing life skills but fingers crossed they won't need to use them!

In science we have learnt about plants and trees. We planted both potato and sunflower seeds and have monitored their growth. We are hoping there will be enough potatoes to cook before the summer. We loved exploring the garden area (it has come alive with plants) and have been taking care of the other plants too. We even spotted some very well camouflaged leaf insects.

The children have thoroughly enjoyed their first half term of tennis sessions. They have been praised on both their tennis skills and ability to listen to instructions. Each session has been full of games and tennis skills. Year 1 children have worked hard in their swimming lessons too. It is fantastic to see how their ability and confidence has grown over the last few weeks.

It DT children problem solved to fix broken wheels before designing and building their own vehicle. They had to include an axle, axle holder and learnt new vocabulary such as chassis. After a lot of glue, masking tape and feathers everyone created a fantastic vehicle with moving wheels.

Miss Hussain has taught computing this half term to both year groups, tackling data handling. Year 2 have learnt about the international space station, how they live in space and how to grow plants in space. They created spreadsheets to show their findings. Year 1 gathered data on different animals using pictograms and tallies to represent their findings.

Year 2 have now completed their SATs. A huge well done to them all for their positive attitude and resilience throughout. We are very proud of you.

Kingfishers

What a fabulous half term we have had, the Kingfishers have given me the best welcome to the school. They have shown me their love for learning and eagerness to impress. The children have especially enjoyed digging into our English writing this half term, creating imaginative and gruesome Roman slave diaries. I have been very impressed with the knowledge the children remembered from Spring 2 when they covered the Romans in History.

In Science, we have learnt about sound and how it travels. After learning all of the facts, we tested them out by creating our own cup and string telephones. We found that our voices travelled more effectively across a distance when using the cup and string phones rather than shouting. Because of our prior learning, we knew this was because sound energy travels quicker and more efficiently through a solid (the string).

We have had lots of fun in DT over the past few weeks with our topic 'From Farm to Fork'. The children started by thinking about all of the ingredients that go into a spaghetti Bolognese. Whilst some of their ideas were interesting, we all agreed that minced meat was a key factor. From this we then explored the process the meat in our meals takes before being on our plates. The children researched this and created information posters. Their taste buds were then put to the test as they played guess the recipe with some shop bought Bolognese sauces. The healthier option came out as a class favourite! The children then researched the nutritional values of the sauces and planned what they would put in their own before finally cooking them and tucking in.

The Kingfishers have enjoyed practicing their rounders skills this half term. I have loved seeing the children confidently volunteer for cricket competitions, as they know their new skills are transferable.

We have had an exciting and packed-full half term! Thank you to all of the Kingfishers for making me feel so welcome, I'm excited to see what fun the next half term has in store for us!









Owls

This half term has been another busy one for the members of Owls Class. We commemorated the coronation of King Charles in school by having a flag competition and learning a song & dance. Even though the weather wasn't great for our picnic, the plants and vegetables in the community garden have enjoyed the rain. The children helped Mr Lewis plant some potatoes early on and more recently we have had lots of peas growing in the raised beds.

Our English lessons this half term have been based on a book called 'The Nowhere Emporium'. The children learned of a magical shop that could send its customers on wonderful adventures to places from their wildest dreams. Year 4 and Year 5 had a lot of fun sending the main character, Daniel on an adventure of their choosing.

The 'Grow a £1' initiative has created a real buzz for enterprise amongst the class. It has been a fantastic way to both use their maths skills and raise funds for the school. All the bracelets, buns and books sold really will help pay for much needed things around school, so a big 'well done' to all who have taken part.

We have enjoyed revisiting the Romans again this half term. This time we have looked specifically at their impact on Britain and their legacy. Now, the children are aware of how the Romans brought better roads, housing, Christianity, written language and coinage to Britain. All things that are still visible in society today.

Everyone has had a lot of fun with our science topic about sound. Firstly, we explored pitch and volume using musical instruments; then we made string telephones to explore how sound changes with distance; and finally the young scientists investigated how to insulate against sound by absorbing the sound waves.

Finally, this week the children learnt to cook a spaghetti bolognese from scratch. Although initially wary of some of the ingredients, the vast majority of the class were impressed with their own creation and found their own version of spag bol delicious!













Eagles

We are endlessly proud of how our Year Six children have handled this half term. SATS week has been and gone and it's time to look towards our last half term together at Kildwick.

There's been plenty of work to keep us busy over the last few weeks. We've done some brilliant writing to show off our talents: a diary based on the tragic story of Rose Blanche; an informative leaflet about Eden Camp; and a spooky story based on the short film 'Alma'.

Our World War Two topic has interested us and we've been able to explore what life was like for people during the war. We also found out about the names mentioned on the Kildwick war memorial and the stories of those men. Our end of half term homework presentations about World War Two were amazing and the most creative yet.

In our music lessons with Mr Schofield, the children wrote and performed their own songs, along with playing musical instruments to accompany the lyrics. In DT, Year Six took part in a 'Come Dine With Me' challenge where they made either a starter, main course or dessert. The children worked so well under pressure and every dish created was a success!

As well as all of this work, there has been plenty of time for fun! We had a lovely afternoon at Glusburn park to celebrate the end of the SATs. Our trip to Eden Camp was informative and fun (especially the play area!). Friday afternoons have been filled with rugby coaching from Darren from Skipton Rugby Club which ended in an inter-school tournament at the end of the half term.

This half term, I've been meeting with representatives from your new schools and they've had the chance to talk to you about what to expect on your upcoming transition days: something else to look forward to!

Children's First Aid

Keeping Safe is one of our PSHE topics this half term and GEM Compliance Training visited school to teach the children some first aid skills. They had fun learning about personal safety during casualty treatment and how to recognise unconscious casualties. They practised bandaging wounds to the head, arms, legs and hands and also putting arms into slings. The children put each other into the recovery position and carried out CPR on manikins.









The Brownlee Foundation Mini Triathlon

This non competitive event involved children taking part in a 50 metre swim, 800 metre cycle and 300 metre run. 
Evidence found at the crime scene included:


Everyone who attended the event thoroughly enjoyed themselves (teachers included) and it is hoped that these experiences will inspire the next generation of scientists.











Marvellous Mathematicians visit South Craven

On Wednesday 24th April, eight maths-loving children went to South Craven School for a maths event along with other local primary schools.

The Year 3 and 4 pupils enjoyed solving the problems in the first round where there were three levels of difficulty for the brain teasers. Competitors received 5, 10 or 20 points (depending on the difficulty) for correct answers.

The Kildwick team went for the hardest ones straight away! Then came a round in which members of the team took turns to collect a triangular piece of a puzzle. To solve the puzzle all the calculations needed to be solved to work out how it fitted together. In the end it was a hexagon, some of the team members had to spot mistakes to work out why it wasn't working.

The finale was a construction task, everyone was given paper straws and paper clips and challenged to build the tallest structure. However, the structure had to support a rubber cube and be freestanding. Eventually with determination, creative thinking and a great deal of teamwork, a truly magnificent construction was created that wowed the Head of Maths at South Craven.

Everyone in the team was rewarded with their own rubber puzzle cube to take home, in addition to all the squash and biscuits they had already consumed!
