The Kildwick Geography Curriculum

<u>Intent</u>

At Kildwick CE VC Primary, the role of Geography is to develop children's interest, appreciation, knowledge and understanding of the diversity of the world and people around us. Children will gain knowledge and understanding of the world, its environments and places near and far, as well as the processes that create and affect them. Geography also enables children to see the interaction between Earth's features, how these change over time and to apply this understanding when learning about different places.

Implementation

Kildwick's Geography curriculum is designed with components which run throughout and are built on in each year group: location knowledge, place knowledge, understanding human and physical geography and geographical skills and fieldwork.

Key Stage One follow a 2 year rolling programme to ensure that children are taught required topics through the key stage. In KS1 children learn to locate the UK and continents of the world. Children develop knowledge of the location and features of their local area and begin to compare their local area to localities in other parts of the world.

Key Stage Two follow a one or three year rolling programme, depending on the year group. Each year, children first study and develop an understanding of two human or physical features in depth. They will then apply this understanding when they come to study a country or region of the world later that year, looking at the human or physical features in the context of that country or region. Low stakes recall quizzes are used to revisit learning and to support children's long term memories. Fieldwork is a key part of Geography which

encourages exploration of their own environment and challenges children to make connections between their local surroundings and contrasting areas.

Impact

The impact of the Kildwick Geography curriculum will be:

- Children will become increasingly aware of the interconnectedness and interaction between Earth's features and will be able to use this understanding when learning about new places
- Children will develop knowledge about different parts of the world and their features.
- Children will have a strong knowledge of locations and will know where different countries, continents, oceans and seas are located.
- Children will be confident in fieldwork skills and enthusiastic about exploring their local area.
- Children will make links between prior and current learning.
- Children will have an appreciation for the diversity of the world its people.
