#### **Swallows**

This half term has certainly flown by! We have managed to squeeze a lot into five weeks. We have welcomed two trainee teachers into class, Miss Abbas and Mr Robertshaw. They have enjoyed getting to know Swallows children. They are with us for another four weeks following half term.

We really enjoyed History this half term, learning about Rosa Parks and the Suffragettes. The children loved acting out different protests and we had a lot of chanting 'votes for women!' We definitely have some budding actors and actresses in our class.

The children were an absolute credit to you and the school on our recent visit to the Gurdwara Singh Sabha in Bradford. They asked lots of thoughtful questions and listened carefully to lots of new information.

In English the children have embraced our text 'George and the Dragon'. They designed their own dragons and wrote some amazing descriptions to go with them.

In science we have been busy learning about different materials. We enjoyed going on a walk to draw different things made from rock or bricks. We have also classified objects made from wood, paper and card and used vocabulary such as 'flexible' to sort them. Finally we looked at objects made from glass and plastic. We carried out an experiment to see if all plastic objects float. We had some fantastic use of vocabulary and discussions about our findings.

In DT with Mrs Oswald the children have learnt about different sliders and the skill to create a moving picture book about humpty dumpty. After half term we are going to share our books with Reception.

Alongside this we have been busy with maths, phonics, spellings, RE, a visit from a STEM ambassador and North Yorkshire police! No wonder we are ready for a rest!

# **Kingfishers**

Well done on a great half term Kingfishers. You have all worked hard to cram lots into 5 weeks. We've managed to have lots of fun along the way too.

The children have particularly enjoyed our DT topic, Cooking and nutrition. The topic started with us taste testing and evaluating biscuits already on the market. We then moved on to creating and making our own biscuits.

Our DT topic paired nicely with our science topic of Reversible and Irreversible Changes. This topic allowed us to complete a number of investigations. We explored the changes in materials when heated, discovering that heating an egg is an irreversible change. Whereas melting wax is reversible as it reverts to its starting state when cooled. We then moved on to explore the key vocabulary - soluble and insoluble. We tested a number of materials to see if they dissolved in water. We learnt that for a material to be soluble (dissolve) it must mix with the water particles and make a translucent solution.

In English, we have written our own narratives. These were based on our class book 'The Great Chocoplot' in which there was a chocapocalypse! The children chose an item to disappear in their own stories, we had stories with everything from pepperoni to whole football stadiums disappearing.

We have also really enjoyed swimming lessons this half term. The children have been a credit to the school with the way they have acted whilst out of school.


I hope you all have a lovely half term, I can't wait to hear about what you've been up to when we return. Miss Norton











#### **Owls**

Our term has been a quick one it seems but we have packed a lot in! Our science lessons have covered irreversible and reversible changes. In one lesson we heated pancake mixture and chocolate separately. The class observed one change that could be reversed and one that couldn't. We decided that once it was a pancake it could never be a mixture (liquid) again because there had been a chemical change (cooking).

We also had a very exciting visit from a STEM ambassador. Dave Rockett, who is an engineer for Northern Gas Networks, visited Owls class to talk about climate change and what we can do to help. One such possibility is using hydrogen to replace some natural gas. Everyone was able to make some hydrogen from water in the classroom! Then they designed a gas network using straws to deliver their new gas to homes.

During our English lessons, we have learned a lot about emperor penguins while writing a non-chronological report together. Once experts at report writing everyone chose their own animal to research and write about. From crabs to capybaras they were great to read!

Year 5 are now fraction experts having tackled some of the toughest concepts, including 'breaking the whole'. We were successful because we always remembered the golden rule of equivalent fractions (opposite). Year 4 mastered multiplication and division methods and have just moved onto length & perimeter.

Finally, this week we have designed and made both biscuits and the packaging for the biscuits. Of course we had to sample our product and it was very good! Then for Safer Internet Day we had a visit from the police who shared their top tips for staying safe online.

# **Eagles**

It's hard to believe how much we've packed into this very short half term in Year Six!



We kick started 2024 by heading down to London to visit the Houses of Parliament. We had an amazing day and luckily what seemed like the only good weather day in the whole of January. It was an incredible experience to go on a sightseeing tour down the River Thames before heading over to the Houses of Parliament. We were able to go into the House of Lords and also went in the viewing gallery of the House of Commons to watch a debate about NHS dentistry.

Back in school, we began to find out about what life was like during the Victorian era. We learnt a few things about Queen Victoria whilst we were in London so we were all keen to find out more about her reign. An experience in a replica Victorian classroom at Bradford Industrial Museum made us very grateful that the education system has improved and developed since the Victorian era. Children recited hymns and times tables, wrote on slates and also with ink dip pens and - most importantly - did not speak unless spoken to! The children got into role well by taking on Victorian names and dressing as children would have at the time.

Elsewhere in the curriculum, Year Six have been powering through working with ratio and decimals and are quickly becoming experts at applying their arithmetic skills to any problems thrown at them.

In our writing, we linked the book 'A Monster Calls' to our Victorian history work to create a nightmare story with a Victorian twist. The children created some spooky, atmospheric stories whilst also ensuring a range of Year Six writing features were used.

We have loved our class book of 'Wild Boy'. It has kept us guessing throughout with its dark, mysterious elements and suspicious characters. We've had lively debates about who the criminals are and we've been left on a cliff hanger over half term until we find out the finale of this grizzly Victorian era tale. I promise I won't read ahead without you, Year Six!

We've been joined by Miss Elks, a trainee teacher, this half term who will be staying with us until the end of June. She's had a great few weeks getting to know all of the children and will begin teaching more lessons after half term.
