These new additions complement the existing extra curricular activities of dance, construction club, running club, cookery club,music and gymnastics. Staff involved with early reading and interventions have been working with The Burley Woodhead English hub, focusing on phonics. We're continually striving to improve, ensuring every child receives the best possible support in learning to read. This is an essential skill that unlocks academic success across the curriculum.

Looking ahead, we want to work with you to increase reading at home. Reading plays an important role in children's mental health and overall academic development, and we've noticed a decline in this area. Our aim is to work with you to make reading a daily habit. Further updates will be shared over the next term and if you have any ideas, please share them with us!

Our commitment to professional development is ongoing. We've been attending various training sessions covering safeguarding, communication and language, climate change, EYFS developments, and SEND best practises. Our partnership with ADYS in Skipton continues, providing valuable external support for our SEND work through half-termly consultations. The games night was a fantastic success! Initially, we were worried about filling the hall, but we didn't need to be! It was truly heartwarming to see so many faces and receive such strong support for both the school and the Down Syndrome Training and Support Service. Our apologies to those who didn't get a chance to play bingo, but we hope you still enjoyed your time with our school community. This was our first games night, and we can definitely say there will be more to come! We raised over £700, so thank you for all the donations and support of this event.

As we continue to face budgetary challenges, your support becomes even more crucial. We're determined to maintain the varied experiences we offer the children, but we need your help. Extracurricular events have not stopped at the school gates and we have enjoyed success across a range of activities this term. Four KS2 pupils represented school at the North Yorkshire Cross Country Finals at Giggleswick and put in an amazing performance. Well done. Key Stage Two pupils have also represented Kildwick against our local cluster of schools in netball and basketball, narrowly missing progressing to the final. What a busy half term! It has been fabulous to enjoy some spring sunshine which has enabled us to spend more time at the rec. The children overflow with imagination and creativity when they have the opportunity to explore the great outdoors. It's wonderful to witness.

We have had a wide variety of visitors this half term including Yorkshire Rotters who taught us about the importance of minimising food waste. We couldn't believe that five Wembley Stadiums of food are wasted. We learnt what can go into our garden compost and how worms are excellent there too. We held worms and learnt that they can have up to 8 hearts.

We also welcomed the Canal and Rivers Trust into school where we looked at dangers around water. Especially important as we have a river and canal so close to school. The children were excellent at spotting dangers and discussing what could be done differently.

Miss Haigh, our student teacher, has enjoyed teaching Geography this half term. They have learnt about different types of weather linking these to seasons. The climate of countries closer and further from the equator and deserts can be both hot and cold!

In computing both year 1 and 2 have learnt about algorithms. Year 1 learnt about inputs and outputs of computers and created their own physical inputs and outputs. We had some very creative ideas. Year 2 built mazes with simple algorithms to direct around it and programmed algorithms into games to complete simple challenges.

In PE we have explored lots of new places through our yoga sessions including under the sea, space and the arctic. We have had some excellent tree poses and brilliant efforts from everybody.

Art has been filled with colour exploration. The children have been making colours, painting and printing. Children were challenged to mix 5 shades of their chosen secondary colour and use them to create patterns. We are extremely proud of how hard the children are working across the curriculum.

That's a wrap! What a wonderful term Kingfishers have had. The children have all worked so hard, with great positivity and had lots of fun.

The Easter production marked the end of the term for us. A big thank you to all class 3 and class 4 who worked incredibly hard this term practising all our songs and lines for the 'Good News' Easter production. We hope you enjoyed watching our production, it was fantastic to see all their hard work come together. At the end of this term Kingfishers also finished swimming lessons at Skipton swimming pool. All the children have shown great enthusiasm in the lessons and they have all worked super hard to improve their swimming skills and water survival skills.

Dance Around the World was the theme in PE and the children had a flavour of Bollywood Dancing, African Dancing and Salsa to name just a few. They started all lessons with a dance game to help them become familiar with the continents where these dance styles come from. The children showed such enthusiasm in the lessons and had a lot of fun. The children also participated in the Skipton Schools Virtual Skipping Challenge. We are still awaiting results but some children managed to complete more than two skips per second! Wow!

In English the children have been learning about diary features and have all been able to write their own diary based on their class book Arthur and the Golden Rope. The class have really enjoyed this book and have written amazing diaries with beautiful handwriting and excellent grammar. The children in phonics have worked extra hard this term with an excellent improvement in handwriting, letter formation and their phonics knowledge. The engagement and positive attitude has been a joy to watch.

In DT, the children have been investigating an existing motorised product and problem-solving to understand its construction. This has allowed them to make their own functional Doodler that creates scribbles on paper. The class really enjoyed creating their product using wonderful DT skills and great teamwork skills.

Spanish has been really successful this term as the children were learning about Las Formas. There were lots of cognates included in the Spanish vocabulary and this was very helpful in translating the Spanish into English. Furthermore, the children have a much greater sense of recognising whether the noun is masculine or feminine and so can match the definite article much more accurately. The Spanish songs also help to embed the learning. Muy Bien Niños!

This term we have had an exciting opportunity to attend trips and welcome guests. The Yorkshire Rotters taught us how to recycle waste and the importance of recycling. The Russell's workshop showed us how the JP developers employ 'Quantity surveyors' and how their job is to calculate the labours and parts for a job. We looked at building a garage using maths and we were all Quantity Surveyors for the day. The year 4 children all had an amazing opportunity to go on a residential at High Adventure and had the chance to complete exciting activities. We also got to see an incredible performance of Wizard of Oz for our World Book Day. The children loved watching this and had a great time. We had the Canal River Trust come in to teach us how to stay safe near the canal and the children were very engaged and really enjoyed this. We also had the chance to go to the Skipton Tennis Club sports where we took part in the Sports Trilogy festival. The children were fantastic and had lots of fun competing in different activities. I hope you all have a wonderful holiday, and enjoy the break with friends and family. We look forward to working with you next term.

We've had a range of different visitors in this half term – the Yorkshire Rotters came to share information (and make our own wormeries and smoothies using a bike!) to help us reduce our food waste and think about how we can use food more wisely. We also had visitors during Science week that covered topics on how to reduce, reuse and recycle and the children showed great prior knowledge as well as enjoying playing a game. Also in Science week we had a visit from Craven college who came to look at adaptation which linked really well to our class book and the children's new knowledge about Charles Darwin. World Book Day treated us all with a production from the Wizard of Oz and the children were mesmerised and immersed in the experience.

In maths the children continue to work well on a range of different maths topics and have all done well in the work on decimals. We enjoyed a visit linking maths to the wider world when we all became junior Quantity Surveyors and had to price up a new garage build – again the children showed great enthusiasm throughout the activities.

In English the children have really enjoyed taking part in a debate, they are all naturals when it comes to expressing their view and in the powers of persuasive language! They then used these skills to write a discussion piece reflecting both arguments around the question – should animals be kept in captivity?

In PE the children have explored the unit – dancing through the ages – this has created a lot of questions about how people danced in the past, some moves were loved and others we found a challenge! Well done to the class as they all did a great job learning a complicated routine. We've also taken part in a Sports Trilogy as well as competing in a virtual skipping competition this term where the whole class have really shown a talent in skipping, well done!
