# **Swallows**

We continue to be impressed with how hard Swallows children are working and their positive attitude towards new experiences and challenges. We have managed to jam pack another five week half term with fun and learning.

We thoroughly enjoyed watching the performance of 'The Secret Garden' to celebrate world book day. It was lovely that some children then brought the book into school so we could share the story again.

As well as World Book Day, we celebrated British Science Week this half term. The zoo lab visited us with huge success. The children were so engaged; asking questions and sharing their own knowledge of animals. The children pushed themselves out of their comfort zone by holding or touching the animals. They particularly enjoyed learning that the Madagascan Hissing Cockroach was like a superhero and it could be frozen for a year and once defrosted still be alive!

In science, we have continued exploring materials. The children have used a wide range of vocabulary to describe materials, classified in different ways and carried out simple experiments such as which fabric would make the best PE kit.

We enjoyed reading our moving story books to Reception children who were a very good audience before beginning to create paper structures. The children have learnt different techniques to roll and fold paper to create 3d paper sculptures.

In computing, both Year One and Two have been learning about algorithms. They have created mazes and written instructions to get through them, given a partner instructions to see if they could create a matching lego model without looking and tried a variety of games on the chromebooks which have explored algorithms.

In Geography, we have learnt all about Kenya and compared it to the United Kingdom. The children are amazing at naming our seven continents and know that Kenya is in Africa. We have compared houses, weather and the life of a child from the Maasai tribe to ours.

We are sad to say goodbye to Miss Abbas and Mr Robertshaw as they move onto the next stage of their teaching degree. They have been a great asset to Swallows class over the last two months. However we do welcome Miss Smeaton and Miss Mahmood into class until May. Have a restful Easter holidays. Hopefully we will experience some blue skies and sunshine! ## **Kingfishers**

Another really busy five week term for Kingfishers class! In Geography this half term we have explored coasts around Britain. It was lovely for the children to draw on their own experiences in this topic, talking about the different coasts they have visited around the country. They have explored the technical processes of erosion!

In art, the children have been exploring sculptures and abstract art. This has called for them to think carefully about how 3D art is formed and manipulated to stand freely. They particularly enjoyed creating their own sculptures using cardboard. When doing this they were challenged not to use glue or tape. They instead had to use cuts and slots to keep their art work connected.

In science, we have looked at the journey food takes through our bodies. This meant first understanding the role of each tooth. We learnt that different animals have different sets of teeth depending on whether they are carnivores, herbivores or omnivores. We then moved onto exploring the digestion process within the body. We found that there are many organs working together in the body that we didn't know were part of the digestion process.

The class especially enjoyed the opportunity to watch The Secret Garden performance. This in turn created a drive for the children to entertain and enthuse their audience in Roll Back The Stone. Well done to everyone on the great performance.

The most exciting moment of the half term for the children was definitely our animal visit. We were taken on a virtual ride through time. Looking at how climate change has affected animals on our planet. We were also introduced to a number of animals found all around the world.

I want to say a massive thank you to all of the children in Kingfishers class for making my time at Kildwick so lovely! I wish them all the best as they grow up and flourish!









#### <u>Owls</u>

The Owls have been busy contemplating the advantages and disadvantages of social media on the lives of young people. This discussion coincided with the government suggestion of a ban on mobile phones in schools. After weighing the pros and cons the children chose the most important points to include in a leaflet designed to help parents keep their children safe online.

Science lessons have covered the different parts of the digestive system and teeth of animals & humans. To investigate which liquids are better or worse for our teeth, we submerged hard boiled eggs in different liquids for a week. The shell of the egg is similar to the enamel on our teeth. Observing what happens to the shell will show us which drinks are more harmful to our teeth.

British Science Week was marked by a visit for Zoolab. Stassia brought in some of her animals to help us understand the concept of 'time' in the biological world. We started in the year 1780 and finished in 2100. Cockroaches, snakes, frogs, rats and tarantulas helped us understand that we humans need to look after the planet for ourselves and the other animals.

Finally, Owls class took a starring role in our Easter production of 'Roll Back The Stone'. This show presented the Easter story in seven songs with short linking narratives. The cantata opened with a 'Hosanna Jesus' - that told of the journey along crowd-lined roads into Jerusalem. The story then moved on to Judas' betrayal, the Last Supper, Jesus' trial, mockery and crucifixion, finishing with the joyful resurrection song 'Roll Back The Stone'. It was fantastic to see those children that had volunteered for parts really take the opportunity to shine and impress us all with their confident singing, acting and narration.













Year Six have had a great five weeks. We've managed to pack an awful lot into such a short time. Dare I say we have even started thinking about the end of Year Six activities - something that will be here before we know it!

Year Six are really getting the hang of showing off a wide range of writing features in their work. We had some brilliant pieces of descriptive writing describing the scarecrow Worzel Gummidge. This was followed by a newspaper report breaking the news that an earthquake had struck Kildwick.

We ended the term with two trips. One to Crucial Crew and the other to a Hindu temple. Crucial Crew equipped us with the skills to keep ourselves safe and the temple opened our eyes to other religions. At Crucial Crew, the children worked their way around various workshops including: fire safety, smoking and CPR. Each workshop was delivered by a range of local professionals including police officers.

A definite highlight over the term has been reading 'Wild Boy' by Rob Lloyd Jones. The book had us discussing possible theories and motives ... and not trusting any characters by the end of it! It's clear that Year Six are fans of a spooky, dark story, so the start of 'Room 13' by Robert Swindells has gone down a treat too.

In DT this half term, the children have researched, designed and created a steady hand game for the children in Swallows class. The children all came up with some great designs and the Swallows children are looking forward to testing the games after Easter.

We had tag rugby training from Darren from Skipton Rugby Club in preparation for a tournament against other schools after the holidays. Another activity Year Six have enjoyed this half term is benchball - a game that certainly brings out the competitive side in all of them!

Along with the rest of school, we enjoyed our visit from Zoo Lab for British Science Week. All children got up close and personal with a variety of animals, although some children were more keen that others!

We've got a big half term next time with lots of opportunities and trips, and also our SATs tests. The children are definitely ready for all of the challenges that the last term of primary school throws at them!
