
Sports Day

We were extremely proud of the children on sports day and they really highlighted how far they have come in terms of listening to and following adult instructions. It was lovely to see the children having a go at each activity and enjoying sports and competing against each other.

In Science, we have been germinating and planting. We spent time in the Peggy Wilson community garden observing garden and wild plants. The children have been learning all about deciduous and evergreen trees. For year one children this was knowledge they should know from Reception and the Reception children were introduced to new knowledge. We also enjoyed a picnic on the Peggy Wilson playing field (aka the Rec!). It has been lovely to finally enjoy the outdoors!

The children are progressing well in phonics and the year ones are getting ready for the phonic screening test. Please see Google Classroom for more information. The Year One children have been working hard on composing their own sentences and editing their work to make it even better.

Year One children have continued to enjoy their Maths lessons with Mrs Kingham and Mrs Matthews alongside the Year One children in Swallows class. Reception children are really starting to show fluency with their mental maths skills and have been working really hard on their number bonds to ten.

In History, the children have been learning all about seaside holidays in the past. I was so impressed at their recall of the key knowledge. They were great at thinking about how things have changed and what it must have been like to live in the past.

I know that we will have just as much fun with our learning next half term as we get ready to move the children on to their next year with either myself or Mrs Carpenter.

Then we began learning about the features of writing instructions. The children certainly are able to think of bossy words! We made and enjoyed jam sandwiches before writing instructions so that someone else could make a sandwich too.

Both Year One and Year Two are working really hard in maths. They become fluent mathematicians in key skills such as multiplication and division facts for 2,5 and 10's, number bonds to ten and twenty, doubling and halving numbers.

We are busy planning our final half term before the summer holidays and are looking forward to a trip to wild explorers and exploring life cycles with some live caterpillars.
