




Picts	Tribes who lived in the northern and eastern areas of Scotland.	<p>The Romans left Britain in 410AD. Roman Britain covered the South coast up to Hadrian's Wall. North of Hadrian's wall and on Ireland, lived the Picts and the Scots. Pict tribes lived in the northern and eastern areas of Scotland and Scot tribes lived on parts of the western coast of Scotland and Ireland. . The The Anglo Saxons then came in ships across the North Sea. The Anglo-Saxon era in Britain was from around 410AD to 1066AD.</p>	<p>Important places</p>
Scots	Tribes who lived on parts of the west coast of Scotland and in Ireland.		
Anglo-Saxon Chronicle	chronological account of events in Anglo-Saxon and Norman England, written towards the end of the Anglo-Saxon period.	<p>The Anglo-Saxons were made up of three tribes: the Angles; Saxons; and Jutes. They invaded when the Romans left. The Anglo Saxons began to battle the Britons left behind by the Romans for land, farms and villages to live in. They did not conquer the Picts and Scots.</p>	Dunadd Hill Fort
tribe	A group of people with a shared culture, language and way of living.	<p>The Picts and Scots also tried to invade England. The Anglo-Saxon Chronicle tells of an Anglo-Saxon king who paid two Jutes and their men to fight the Picts. Instead, they arrived and seized the king's kingdom. No one knows if this is a true story, but it shows that the Picts were invading and that some of the Jute or Anglo-Saxon newcomers were invited to Britain.</p>	Dal Riata
